Restore Me To Sanity? Does That Mean I'm Insane?

In Step 2, we came to believe that a power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity. As a newcomer, this was a difficult step to take for two reasons. First, I did not really believe in God; I considered myself to be agnostic. I had no interest in religion or powers greater than myself. I didn't see what God had to do with quitting drinking. It filled me with anger to think that these freaky program people were going to shove their religious beliefs down my throat! Second, I didn't feel like I needed to be restored to sanity. I was not 'insane'. I just had a drinking problem; if I could stop drinking, I would be just fine. At least that's what I thought until I actually stopped!

In early sobriety, we get a chance to get up close and personal with the reasons we drank. Only in sobriety can we fully experience true insanity! In my first few weeks, I could not even sleep at night. I realized that I didn't know how to get in bed and go to sleep. I was used to drinking until I passed out. I would wait until my eyes were involuntarily starting to close, drag myself to bed and collapse. Sometimes I wouldn't quite make it and I'd fall asleep on the couch. I learned, in my first month of sobriety, that passing out and going to bed are two different things. I had to re-learn the simplest things, like eating and sleeping, in early sobriety. In my first year, it was just too painful to face reality all at once. I had lived in a state of denial for so long that my mind could only handle little bits and pieces of truth. When I got sober, I really believed that I was doing pretty well in life with the exception of getting drunk every night. In reality, I was deeply in debt, I had no friends, and I had alienated myself from my family. I had legal problems. My driver's license was suspended. I went to Publix and wrote bad checks to buy wine when I had no money. I consistently got my son, who was in 2nd grade at the time, to school late because I was so hung over. Mornings were unbearable. Alcohol was my protective armor, my veil of denial that allowed me to continue functioning. Since I didn't have alcohol to numb me anymore, I reached out for anything that would soften the blow of reality. I smoked cigarettes, ate ice cream, purchased things I couldn't afford, created relationship drama... Any distraction would do! In one of my regular meetings, Jimmy S. compared early sobriety to a game of Whack-a-Mole. As soon as one unacceptable behavior is hammered down, another inevitably pops up.

We alcoholics will go to great lengths to avoid our feelings!

Slowly but surely, the steps give us the courage to look at our lives and accept the reality that we have been truly insane. We come to believe that our higher power and the 12 steps really can restore us to sanity. Only when I accepted the fact that my problem was much deeper than drinking too much, could I begin to heal. I believe, if we work the program diligently and trust in our higher power, we can enjoy the gift of real healing and recovery.

Pappy's Interview Interviewer: Suzanne H. July 17, 1988

Cont. from Oct. 2011 ... S— You've certainly made the JABA Club a friendly place. P— That's what we do. We're not in this for the money. S— Do they still have the annual banquets? P— Yes. Since 1965.

S— That seems kind of late to start. P— A lot of them started earlier and have closed up. S— Intergroup was started before that and the Add-A-Line was first published in 1962. P— I voted against Intergroup then and I'd vote against it now, too. Serves no purpose; committees on top of committees, organized mayhem. S— Its purpose is to help communication. Can you tell me about the 12 Step work in the 1950's and 60's? P— That's the saddest thing about it—the saddest point in the history of A.A. the lack of 12 Step work today. The greatest reward you get out of being sober is to have the ability in the world to carry the 12 Steps into action. It's a lost cause without it. We've made millions and millions of calls to treatment centers. S— Usually the treatment centers get people before A.A. does. P— And, A.A. sends them there, that's where they have to start. A.A. is involved in the challenge. I can remember there weren't many centers when I came into A.A. We'd go to a person and stay with them until we got a definite yes or no if the person wanted help. They don't do it anymore. It irritates me to get on the

phone and tell someone I have a hard-core case and no one is there to go with me. S— Do you suggest taking someone with you? P— Anybody who goes on a 12 Step call without someone with them is a fool. It's dangerous to go by yourself. Had a man pull a gun on me once when I was foolish enough to go alone. But he came into the program and is still in the program. I don't think he remembers what happened. S— Maybe if someone were with you he wouldn't have tried to be violent. P— May have but two heads are better than one in an emergency. S— Do you see many changes in the meetings over the years? P— That's sad, too. We had a meeting last week for beginners, raw recruits, not many members in the program were invited, so they had nothing to offer. It was chaired by new people. It's like kindergartners running the school. That's sad. We never would have had that. New people would sit in the front row and if they started to open their mouth the Chairman would say, "shut up!" Six months later if they were

still around we'd be happy to talk to them. That was a good philosophy. S— You had a JABA Board at that time? P— Even before we had a club we formed a private corporation, the day we started we had federal taxes handles, everything. San Marco has a board, too. S— Did you have open membership business meetings? P— No ma'am. The board runs it and if people don't like it, don't come. We're not going to have a bunch of controversy. S— I can't think of any more questions— can you think of anything that would be historically interesting? P— I'm sure being the oldest member in A.A. in town along with a guy at the beach, I could go on. Our biggest enemies in this world are greed, resentment, envy, fear, frustration and self-pity. We have to deal with them one at a time and A.A. is the highest place a person can turn in this world. If you've paid your dues, why not enjoy the benefits? You don't have to be a drunk to be useless. If a man answers to his belly he drains away; if he answers to his head no one can take that away from him. The Five D's of A.A.—

depression, desire, decision, determination and dedication. Work with the constructive crew, not the wrecking crew. When God seems far away—who moved? In praying it doesn't matter what position your body is so long as the brain is on its knees. You'll never get a busy signal on God's telephone line; HIS office is open 24 hours a day. You have to be thinking about drinking before you actually do it. It's wonderful to be wanted. If you have diabetes you take insulin every day, if you have alcoholism you take A.A. every day. Coming into A.A. is like walking out of a dark room into the sunlight—and I know that's true because that's exactly what happened to me. You should be enthusiastic about A.A. as you were about your drinking. When your head begins to swell your mind stops growing. The time to attend an A.A. meeting is when you least feel like going. Easy does it—sometimes that's all I have done. My job today is that I don't have to drink. **End**

Tradition Two

“For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority- a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants; they do not govern. (Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, Pg.132) For this AA, the second tradition clears up a lot when it comes to how we have accomplished and continue to do so much as a fellowship. The fact of the matter is that when we answer to a loving God, we are not tethered by the egos or personalities or agendas of our leadership but to the will of God. The brilliance of this is that even though we might have individual differences when it comes to understanding God’s will, our group conscience clarifies this by identifying what we have in common understanding of His will. Then, both leading and following become a matter of doing God’s will, which we learn in Steps 3 and 11.

Effective leadership in AA is all about being a “trusted servant”. I have approached the positions that I have held in my home group from the perspective of service to the group and not acting with authority. As with most of us, I have a history with authority and it is not always good whether I have been on the giving end or the receiving end. Service to others is my ticket out of my head and my selfishness.

The long and short of Tradition Two is that it keeps us humble and aware that God is in charge and that is a good thing! A.A. has no CEO, no grand poobah, no ranking system, or black belts, we are all just bozos on the bus and a Higher Power is driving it.

Concept II

When, in 1955, the A.A. groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Service Conference, they thereby delegated to the Conference complete authority for the active maintenance of our world services and thereby made the Conference-excepting for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of the Conference Charter-the actual voice and the effective conscience for our whole Society. (Twelve Concepts for World Service pg 8)

In the early days of our fellowship, over half a century ago, Bill W and Doctor Bob themselves took on the daunting task of coordinating world services. They were delegated to do so by the groups in Akron and New York back in 1937. Given that New York was tactically better suited to serve as the staging ground for this undertaking in terms of manpower and funding, Doctor Bob entrusted Bill W with the majority of this undertaking and Bill W. A Board of Trustees who were not in the fellowship was recruited to handle the operations of world services, which was largely the printing and distribution of literature like the Big Book and Grapevine.

While this Board of Trustees was effective in terms of handling the logistics and financial matters of the world services, they did not handle public relations in terms of speaking on behalf of the fellowship nor did they have the ultimate authority on these matters. Dr. Bob and Bill W. maintained those duties, but they knew that eventually, this function needed to be passed on. A General Service Conference consisting of trusted servants from our groups was created to serve in this capacity on an ongoing basis. This way, a representative group of AA's could serve the fellowship by carrying these vital roles on. The AA community would have a designated voice and a designated conscience to both articulate and arbitrate our collective position on matters of world service. Bill W. ends the chapter on this concept by explaining why establishing the General Service Conference was so important: **"In making this momentous transfer, we old-timers deeply hope that we have avoided those pitfalls into which societies have so often fallen because their originators have failed, during their lifetimes, to properly delegate and distribute their own authority, responsibility, and leadership."** (Twelve Concepts for World Service pg 10)

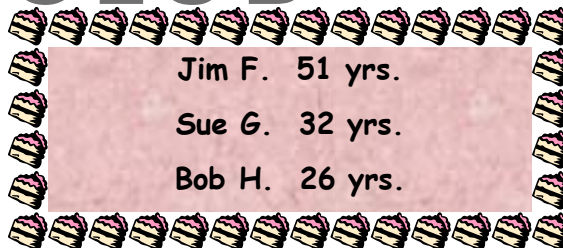
